Bird-Rooster

Roosters, also known as male chickens, are originally from India whose ancestors ran wild in the jungle. They are now found all over the world and have an estimated population of 23 billion! They are known to be loyal and protective, looking after the hens of their flock. If they feel threatened, they will flap their wings ferociously and attack predators with the sharp bone protrusions (called spurs) that grow from their ankles. Around 5 months of age, roosters begin to crow each dawn to wake their flock and let them know it's time for breakfast. Roosters are omnivores and eat almost anything including vegetables, fruit, and insects. They are quite sociable too and mate with their entire flock!

Birthstone-Citrine

This month's birthstone gets its name from the French word *citron*, meaning lemon. The name perfectly fits this stone's vibrant yellow, gold, and amber tones! Its colors match the sun's rays and the beautiful fall colors of November. Throughout history, this quartz has been regarded as a stone of happiness & optimism. It's believed to bring good fortune and success to its wearers. Flower-Chrysanthemum

The Chrysanthemum is a beautiful perennial and a favorite for many gardeners and flower enthusiasts! Its name comes from *Chrysos*, which is a Greek word meaning *gold*. Although mums can be found in a rainbow of colors today, their wild ancestors were a golden yellow hue. Beautiful as they are, Chrysanthemums can be used as more than a garden flower. Grateful and Blessed

The sign read, "Grateful and Blessed!" Printed over a thanksgiving pumpkin background, it reminded me to be thankful because of God's goodness.

We know what grateful means, but what does "blessed" really mean? Does it indicate my life will always be financially stable, with many good friends, and never any illness or needs?

Ponder the word "blessed." Perhaps we flippantly throw that word around—"God bless you;" or "I am blessed"—as if to show that following God means all my life is great, there are no problems. But our experiences in this world tell us otherwise.

"Blessed" appears in the first book of the Bible right after Creation. God blessed his creation and gave a directive, "Be fruitful and increase in numbers..." (Genesis 1:22 & 28).

Then in Genesis 12 God gave Abraham a unique blessing, which promised the eventual coming of the Messiah through Abraham's lineage.

The LORD had said to Abram...
